#### SUMMARY/BACKGROUND:

The Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) is a federally required document that is updated every 5 years. This plan provides transportation investments for the region identifying multimodal transportation needs over the next 25 years.

A draft of the Final RTP was submitted to stakeholders and TAC members on October, 27, 2021 for review and comment with a resubmittal due date of November 19, 2021.

Notice to the public was posted on November 3, 2021 to the newspaper and relevant social media sites. The notice gives the public an opportunity to submit their comments of the Draft RTP until December 3, 2021.

The Final Draft, which will include revisions based on stakeholder, TAC, and Public comments, will be presented to the LHMPO Executive Board for approval their first meeting of 2022 (January – February).

LHMPO staff is recommending TAC approval to take the 2045 RTP (and necessary revisions) to Executive Board for approval.
